

My first degree (2001) was in English Language and Literature at the University of Athens and my Master degree (2004) in Theoretical and Applied Linguistics at the Aristotle University of Thessaloniki. My Ph.D. thesis (2010) 'Exploring the Syntax-Discourse and Lexicon-Syntax Interfaces in Language Pathology: Evidence from Broca's aphasia' was concerned with the processing of ambiguous subject pronouns and unaccusative verbs, as well as the verbal working memory capacities of Greek-speaking patients with Broca's aphasia. Subsequently, I worked as a post-doctoral researcher on the project 'The cognitive mechanism of inhibition in Broca's aphasia' (2011) at the Language Development Lab, at the Department of English Studies, Aristotle University of Thessaloniki. My current postdoctoral research (financed by the Research Committee of the Aristotle University of Thessaloniki) investigates Broca's aphasics' grammatical processing abilities by using eye-tracking methodology. My main interests are acquired language disorders, second language acquisition, Specific Language Impairment, and language and cognitive processing, in general.
