Course description.

The purpose of this class is to analyze seminal texts by 19th century American writers. It will focus primarily but not exclusively on Nathaniel Hawthorne, Herman Melville, Henry James, Mark Twain, Stephen Crane, Kate Chopin and others. It will argue the centrality of novels such as Hawthorne's <u>The Scarlet Letter</u> in the development of American literature; it will discuss the importance of Melville's "Benito Cereno" and Twain's <u>Adventures of Huck Finn</u> in the 19th century controversies over race and it will focus on Chopin's <u>The Awakening</u> as a protofeminist text. At the same time, it will connect such texts with the literary currents of the second half of the 19th century, but also with American traditional modes of writing.
